

In the passage above:

- **Those** stands for the days when I was a student.
- **These** stands for the ten rupee currency notes.
- **This** stands for the piggy bank.

These are examples of demonstrative pronouns.

Sometimes **such**, **none** and **neither** are also used as **demonstrative pronouns**.

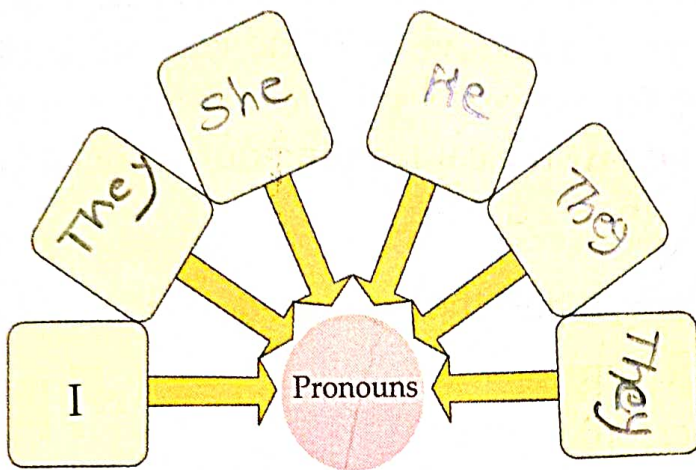
