Verbs: Finite and Non-finite



Nicky and Ricky know that a sentence must have a verb.

Yet, one of Nicky's sentences and three of Ricky's sentences are wrong.

Nicky, Ricky, and you need to know the following:

A sentence must have at least one finite verb. A finite verb makes a sentence complete.

A verb ending in —ing is a non-finite verb. It needs a helping verb to become finite.

A verb with to before it is also a non-finite verb. It does not show tense.

Non-finite verbs do not make a sentence complete. They do not agree with the subject.

Sheila immediately <u>went</u> to see her grandmother after arriving from Malaysia.

She wants to go camping in the jungles of Sundarbans in West Bengal.

She will be flying to Kolkata after she returns from Alibaug.

She also may go to Shantiniketan to play Holi.



Say it aloud

There are two kinds of verbs: finite verbs and non-finite verbs.

A finite verb functions as the main verb in a sentence. It shows tense and agreement with the subject.

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A non-finite verb does not show tense, e.g. She asked us to study. [Finite verb: asked (shows past tense); Non-finite verb: to study (shows no tense)].

A non-finite verb cannot stand alone as the main verb in a sentence, e.g. We studying. (main verb: nil).

We add a helping verb to a non-finite verb to make it finite, e.g. We are studying.
